Small college. Big outcomes. Vermont Tech!

In June, Professor Emeritus Ken Vandermark took Vermont Tech students to Arusha, Tanzania with a passive solar water heater for LOHADA, a non-profit charity serving impoverished children

and the elderly. The Camp Joshua Christian School is located in one of the poorest slums of Arusha; Ken serves on the Board of Directors.

Ken traveled to Tanzania in 2001, inspired by Cal Blessing, Professor Emeritus of Mathematics, who volunteered his time in Kenya with the Maasai. Ken researched what he could do for community service, found a Tanzania trip, and fell in love with the children. His service included repairing bunk beds and even teaching them about Halloween. Babu Ken, Swahili for Grandfather Ken, noticed during his trip that there was no warm water for the children to wash.

Ken tasked senior Vermont Tech Mechanical Engineering students with designing and building a solar hot water tank. Chris Sabatino, Jarek Hammerl, Cory Dalsimer, and Drew Gough

spent their spring semester on this capstone project. The heater had to be as durable as possible to

minimize future repairs and provide clean, hot water for years to come.

While they were abroad, Ken took the students through the slums to see "tin roofs with holes during the rainy season…and how there is one bed for five people" for a perspective of why he was so dedicated to the Tanzania children. "The whole idea was to get people interested in community service and 'community' as in the whole world."

Continuing his passion for service here at home, Ken tutors adults as they strive to complete their education. A member of the Randolph Rotary Club and Advisor to the Vermont Tech Rotaract Club, the collegiate arm of Rotary International, Ken works to make lasting change across the world by providing service to others, promoting integrity, and advancing peace. One Rotaract service project is raising money for special books



in elementary schools – personalized stories about the children receiving them to make them more excited about reading.

Ken's passion for education, children, and community all over the world is inspiring and admirable.



Jamie Heiam was working in commercial fishing in Homer, Alaska when she encountered the Coast Guard and *"it triggered something… I*

remember vividly thinking, it's only four years and if I hate it, whatever, I'll at least get something out of it."

On a waiting list for aviation, she walked lines at the communication station in Alaska, studied Administration at the Coast Guard Academy in Connecticut, and deployed overseas to Bahrain doing security watch over the Persian Gulf with an M16. There, Jamie felt like a minority, as she was the only woman on her base.

After five years in the Coast Guard, Jamie traveled, hiked mountains, volunteered in Kilimanjaro, then decided to utilize her GI Bill®. Her desire for aviation led her to the Vermont Tech Professional Pilot bachelor's degree, where she connected with Doug Smith, Assistant Professor and Program Director at the time. They talked about the program, then Doug took her into the air over Burlington that same afternoon. *"I was hooked right then!"*

Starting school at 27 wasn't easy, and she was again the gender minority in her field of study. But Vermont Tech made her feel normal. *"The mix of people was great."*

Jamie now works for Pipeline Patrol and is landing job offers from

Alaskan Airlines to customs and border control to intelligence work.

service years was the people she shared it with. "Going through the same thing they're going through creates a bond." She didn't let being a gender minority stop her from pursuing her passion of wanting to help others. That attitude is readily apparent in Jamie, not only in her aspirations and contributions, but also in the dedication of her service.

One of many AmeriCorps VISTAs to serve at Vermont Tech, Elissa Lee graduated from Vermont Tech with a degree in Business Technology & Management in 2016.

Her VISTA role was to organize efforts and document activities, such as Rosie's Girls STEM Leadership Camp, to increase female in non-traditional majors. She saw how role models *"make a significant difference in the education and careers that young girls pursue."* One camper became so excited meeting a female flight instructor from Vermont Tech, she couldn't wait to start a career in aviation! Elissa joined AmeriCorps strictly to serve. She wanted to "extend a hand out to those seeking a better opportunity." Not only did her service year impact her thoughts about poverty or lack of resources, she saw that it also changed girls' thoughts of STEM. Elissa was thrilled to see girls come back again the next summer for the Advanced Coder Camp.

Elissa is now back at Vermont Tech pursuing a Software Engineering career. "I really believe in the saying 'be the change you want to see!' so here I am, a women studying and pursuing a career in technology."

Zoe McDonald assumed Elissa's role the following year, with the same focus: to increase the percentage of women in STEM careers.

To her duties, she added positions on two new committees: Speaker Series and Volunteer Committee, part of President Moulton's Culture of Community initiative focusing on multicultural awareness and respect.

The AmeriCorps position appealed to Zoe because of her interest in feminism and an opportunity to experience the inner workings of a college. "I joined VISTA because its mission combines government support with the strengths of local communities... focus on promoting higher education for socioeconomically disadvantaged students." She described how participating in events like the annual *Women Can Do!* Conference, which offers hands-on workshops highlighting skilled trades and STEM career fields to high school girls, emphasizes the importance of promoting education.

During the Rosie's Girls Camp, the mother of a camper explained that her daughter struggled with writing. At the conclusion of the camp, the daughter excitedly told her mom that she wrote a 500-word story in the writing workshop. Moments like this reminded Zoe that positive role models are important.

What she enjoyed most about her service at Vermont Tech, however, was the tight-knit community she experienced. "The Vermont Tech community runs deep, and it's an honor to be a part of it."

The 24-year old Michigan native graduated with a BA in Sociology from Illinois State University, but lacked the experience and connections for a full-time job. So she applied as an AmeriCorps FEMA volunteer, traveling the country assisting communities impacted by natural disasters. *"Not only did I get to serve my country, but I also got to explore states that I might not have ever gone to. I got to learn different cultures and expand my horizons."* Now, two years later, she is volunteering again, this time in Vermont Tech's Development Office.

Kelly is another Vermont Tech AmeriCorps VISTA with a one-year term as a professional volunteer focused on writing grants and coordinating events to promote the college to low-income students. VISTAs across the country help non-profits, including colleges and universities, recruit volunteers and raise funds.

Kelly started her service at Vermont Tech in Randolph Center in August, and is already making connections with alumni. "I would have to say my favorite part of my service year so far has been planning and implementing the 2018 Homecoming Festival." She enjoyed cutting a 'log cookie' with a four-handed saw and engraving it with a Vermont Tech stencil made by mechanical engineering technology students. However, the highlight of her day was bonding with members of the class of 1968 during their 50th reunion. She's gaining experience in grant writing, networking, and event planning to better her future employment opportunities.

The first space for veterans at Vermont Tech was the Vet Center, but the room was too small and not readily accessible, so the Veterans Club wanted a dedicated space. With the help of Vermont Tech faculty and staff, including Steve Belitsos, Greg Hughes, Mary Kathryn Juskiewicz, John O'Donnell, Nancy Guild, Dwight Cross, and more, a Veterans Lounge was created in Conant Hall in 2016.

On April 26, 2017, the new Veterans Lounge was dedicated to three former Vermont Tech students – **Adam Muller**, **Jamie Gray**, and **Kevin Sheehan** – in honor of these three veterans who fell in the line of duty. During the ceremony, President Moulton expressed, "This space is important because the college has a long history of providing a supportive environment for student veterans... [We are] thrilled to host veterans and to be such a welcoming and warm place."



A PLACE OF THEIR OWN

Vermont Tech student Chris Sabatino, President of the Veterans Club, was grateful for the support and the dedication of the plaque and room, which "makes it an important space, tying past veterans to present ones – it has captured the history here."

The Veterans Lounge offers a "proper" place for veterans to decompress, have a quiet place to sit, or to talk and see friendly faces. As a veteran himself with six years of active duty service as an infantry officer, Chris uses the lounge for club meetings and a way for veteran students to stay connected. "Transition between military service, civilian life, and school can be difficult, so this is a place that helps students make that transition."

During Homecoming 2018, the Veterans Lounge was open for everyone to see, and gave a chance for alumni, employees, and students to check out the space, grab some coffee, and honor the fallen. Each semester, there are orientations in the lounge where current veterans welcome their incoming brothers-and-sisters-in-arms. Events in the lounge are kept to a minimum, however; the space is purposely kept quiet to have a private, familiar area. As Chris said simply, "A space where a veteran can be a veteran."

Mark Moyer interrupted his college education at Vermont Tech to enlist in the US Army and, in 1991, deployed to the

Persian Gulf in support of Operation Desert Shield/Storm to fight Saddam Hussein's Republican Guard in Iraq and Kuwait. "We were a corps asset and fought alongside many different coalition forces," he recalled. After three years of active duty, Mark transitioned into the National Guard for eight years, and used his GI Bill[®] benefits to return to Vermont Tech to complete his degree in Civil Engineering. In addition to a friend on the same college path, Mark found another familiar face on campus. "Marc Bilodeau, my RA when I first attended VTC, was a Residence Director in Nutting Hall when *I returned."* Mark graduated in 1996 and is now a Construction Quality Assurance Operations Manager for the Weaver Consultants Group in Grand Rapids, Michigan. "I'm proud that Vermont Tech helped get me to where I am."

Mark continues to support veterans whenever he can. He and his wife, Lynette, have set up a substantial bequest to provide an endowed scholarship for veterans studying engineering at Vermont Tech in the future, and the couple just recently made a cash donation

Friday morning, Vermont Tech saw the Professional Pilot, Business Management, Agriculture, Fire Science, Automotive, Diesel, and more cross the stage. In the afternoon, it was time for all the engineering-related degrees. Then, on Saturday morning, the Allied Health students – Nursing, Respiratory Therapy, and Paramedicine – received their degrees. In her address, Commencement speaker Janette Bombardier, a civil engineer, spoke of her years at IBM and GlobalFoundries, and threw out the old idiom 'ladder of success' in favor of a more accurate analogy: **"Success isn't a ladder, it's a jungle gym with more than one way to the top."** After many years at IBM and Green Mountain Power, Ms. Bombardier is now Chief Technology Officer at Chroma Technology.









SCHOOLS MODEL

In 2018, the faculty initiated a discussion about reorganizing academic programs into schools. An ad-hoc committee recommended that the college proceed with the model and suggested four schools with a distribution of programs among those schools. A market research study indicated that the schools model might increase net promoter scores, particularly among guidance counselors. During the summer of 2018, a second committee, comprised primarily of faculty, reviewed the model and recommended a fifth category of school to incorporate general education. The schools model concept was endorsed by the Faculty Assembly and Executive Committee in the fall of 2018.
