As we continue our transformation to Vermont State University, we have much to be proud of, and so much to bring to this new vision for higher education in Vermont.

- **RETURN ON INVESTMENT. This year, we ranked first in the state and #7 nationally among four-year public universities with the best short-term net value, according to a report from Georgetown University's Center on Education and the Workforce, which ranked 4,500 colleges and universities across the country. The ranking speaks to our prowess in preparing career-ready students.
- » STUDENT SUCCESS AND JOB PLACEMENT. Our students continue to achieve and accomplish – in 2022, we saw our students maintain a 99% job placement rate within six months of graduation, and we also continue to have the highest-earning graduates of any Vermont college. Many of our students go on to answer the workforce needs of our state, serving in critical occupations.
- Manufacturing Center formally opened in a celebration headlined by Senator Patrick Leahy, who was instrumental in the funding and founding of the center. The AMC provides our students with the incredible opportunity to develop, design, manufacture, post-process, and engage in quality assurance with faculty and work in partnership with local businesses doing prototypes, small-batch manufacturing, and product testing. The future of manufacturing is in Randolph, Vermont!

THE FUTURE OF AGRICULTURAL EDUCATION. Speaking of the future, this year we introduced a new vision that builds on our 120-year history of agricultural education. Our new Center for Agriculture & Food Entrepreneurship, slated to open in 2024, will expand educational opportunities in a variety of modalities and in a range of fields of study, including new concentrations in diversified livestock, regenerative farming, brewing, meat curing, food entrepreneurship, and other value-added produce. We will offer an Associate Degree in Agriculture & Food Entrepreneurship, and students may choose to go on to complete a bachelor's degree in either Diversified Agriculture or another degree offered at Vermont State University. We look forward to remaining a vital force for educating and training the next generation of bright, innovative farmers, food workers, and food entrepreneurs.

There are many ways in which our faculty, staff, and students strived and thrived in 2022. We are impressed by their resilience and celebrate their accomplishments. To alumni, we say, our hats off to you on your numerous successes and positive contributions to society. You are integral to our history as an institution, and you make your alma mater look so good.



Vermont Technical College's Athletic Department hosted its inaugural Athletic Hall of Fame event in conjunction with the college's annual Homecoming weekend.

"We want to ensure that Vermont Tech's athletics legacy is retained in a formal manner," said Hilary Linehan, Director of Athletics and Recreation at the college. "The athletes inaugurated into this first Hall of Fame class showed exceptional talent and willingness to work hard both in the classroom and on the playing surface."

Athletics have a long history at Vermont Tech, dating back to the 1960s. The athletic teams started as part of the NJCAA, competing with some schools within the same athletic conference for more than 50 years. After the college added its first bachelor's degree program in Architectural Engineering Technology in 1993, Vermont Tech moved over to the U.S. Small College Athletic Association, which rebranded as the United States Collegiate Athletic Association (USCAA) in 2005.

Vermont Tech has a history of excellence in athletics, with hundreds of student-athletes earning national and conference All-Academic, All-Conference and All-American awards. Our teams have also followed this pattern of excellence, appearing in over 50 different Conference and National Championship tournaments and events, and winning nine of these.

"While we honor this year's class of athletes, we know there are more out there that will be nominated for a future class," Linehan said. "We expect to open nominations with Homecoming registration this year so please be sure to check the website to place your nomination."

In response to evolving educational needs of Vermont's workforce, technical courses were added to the offerings of the school in 1957 and the institution was given a new name reflecting this expanding mission: Vermont Agricultural and Technical Institute (VATI). It was the first and only technical institute in Vermont, with an initial enrollment of approximately 75 students. It was then that we educated not only the farmers, but the highway engineers and electrical engineers for Vermont's growing industrial production.



Thomas "Tom" Roughton, AG '46 Growing up in New York City, Tom moved to Vermont to help on a farm and stayed for eight years. Once he graduated from high school he went to Vermont Tech (known then as Vermont School of Agriculture [VSA]) because of his interest in farming. He noted a memory of working on the farm at Vermont Tech stating, "It was a great school for me. Part of our tuition was putting in so many hours of work per year and if you worked more, they would pay you \$3.00 per hour, if I remember. I used to run the dairy room in the milking barn and it was a morning and night job. My job was to sanitize and keep it clean. I think I paid most of my own tuition just working on the farm at VSA." After graduation, he had a job lined up in Minnesota working for a milking machine company. Later, he worked for John Deere and became a Construction Equipment Dealer for 20 years and was the President of the Equipment Dealers Association. Afterward, he moved to Wisconsin and raised beef cattle for 40 years and then moved to organic chickens up until last year. Now he is residing anywhere to stay close to family. Tom also attended the 2022 Homecoming Weekend (pictured on page 3) and represented the oldest graduating class, celebrating 77 years!

James "Jim" Hoyt, AG '50 Jim lived on campus in Old Dorm and was involved in baseball and basketball. Currently, he's a Division Sales Manager at John Deere where he has worked for 35 years!

Gene Sargent, HT '59 After being honorably discharged from the Korean War, Gene came to Vermont Tech per his father's suggestion. He noted, "Calculators were just coming out then!" He also disclosed that Vermont Tech was a great school and shared, "I lived on campus and there were always guys trying to crazy things!" Once he graduated, he used his degree right away and helped to build highways through the State Highway Department. He worked there for almost 20 years as a Head Inspector. Then Gene started his own real estate business and helped run it with his wife and his two daughters in Chelsea, VT. Now, Gene is happily retired and enjoying his home.

Louis L. Hall, AG '65 Louis came to Vermont Tech to pursue an education in Agriculture, as he is part of a 5th generation dairy farm called Whey Run Farm in Orwell, VT. He was also involved as a Fire Chief for 39 years and had been part of the department for 53 years. Now retired, Louis is still farming with his family.

John E. Hunter, MEC '65 "During the 1965 senior recruiting phase at VTC, I was hired by Jones and Lamson Machine Company of Springfield, VT. There were five of us hired out of VTC at that time, three Mechanical and two Electrical techs. I was the only one left from that group when they closed their doors in 1986. I was able to work my way through the ranks doing mechanical machine design, starting as a draftsman, and working for both the grinder product line and the lathe product line (even getting involved with some early robotics cells in the 70's) working up thru Senior Design Engineer, before ending up as a Lead Man for the Lathe Engineering group. That position entailed reviewing all the incoming machine orders for our department and working with the Engineering Manager to choose which staff members would get certain jobs. I was fortunate enough to use my VTC training during my whole career, even after J&L closed. My wife and I are now retired in North Springfield; have three children, and six grandchildren." Warren N. Vincentz, CET '68 Warren lived in Old Dorm and was part of the Yearbook Club while attending Vermont Tech. Now, he is retired from 33 years as a Resident Engineer and lives in New Jersey.

Robert "Bob" Boisvert EM '71 Back when Bob was attending Vermont Tech, he lived in Old Dorm and was part of the Radio-Controlled Model Club. Now, he has retired from 35 years of service at IBM as a Senior Service Planner.

Winston Chambers, CET '72 Taking a drafting class in high school, led to Winston's interest in Civil Engineering. He chose Vermont Tech because of the degree option and right after he

graduated, he obtained a job at Dufrane Henry Engineering in Springfield, VT where he worked for 18.5 years! He stated, "I used my degree as it helped with overseeing sewer and water projects." Then Winston worked at Dartmouth College for 27 years as a Construction Manager and his favorite part was, "everything...because it was interesting meeting new people, and building and coordinating projects from all over the country." Winston stated, "I highly recommend Vermont Tech...excellent job placement and teaching." Now, Winston is retired and came to the 2022 Homecoming/Alumni Day on September 24th for his 50th reunion!

Rene Roy, EET '72 Rene shared, "I enrolled in the Pre-Engineering program in 1969 with no loss of credits from the GI Bill. I lived in the Old Dorm for one year with my roommate Peter Kane. We commuted back and forth from Island Pond on the weekends. To lower college costs, I was a dorm counselor for one year and I worked with Perry Lanou one summer cleaning rooms. That was a good thing, as I lost twenty-five pounds that summer. I remember one weekend in the winter out of sheer boredom a couple of us from the college decided to visit New York but stayed too late. On our trip back to the college, we ran into a snow squall and drove off the road hitting a telephone pole. Without a ride, Vermont Tech Security drove to the hospital to return us back to the college. I will never forget that one act of kindness. After graduating, I worked at various companies running a gamut of various disciplines." Now Rene is enjoying retirement.

Paul Stanley, AG '74 A message from Paul: "HI to all at VTC and alumni! It's been a lot of water over the dam in the last 48 years. As we approach our 50th year reunion there is much change happening at the "Tech". This is not something like change in curriculum, this is major; from combining institutes, to selling the Dairy Herd, and moving what we teach about Ag to a whole new concept. In a fifth sense, we are going back in time where living off the land meant providing for you and the family and selling what you could in the city.
